

Eco Club

The Eco Club have been working hard within their 3 teams to complete activities to gain accreditation for this year's Green Eco Schools Award.

The Healthy Living Team completed research on vegan/plant-based recipes that they wanted to cook. The team cooked a tofu stir fry, vegan pancakes and griddled courgette wraps, which were all trialled out by small group of Year 8 students and a member of the canteen staff. The students are really keen for one of their recipes to be put on the school lunch menu one day, and we will continue to work with the catering team to pursue this.

The Global Citizens Team and other members of the group were keen to campaign for free bus travel for Under 16s in Leicester. Letters were sent to our local member of parliament and we have since had a reply. However, the students were disappointed with the reply as it became clear that their hope for free travel for secondary students was not going to become a reality.

Finally, the Energy Team took part in the *Great Switch Off* at the beginning of February, compiling a tick list of small items in school that could be switched off. Students surveyed all classrooms to check whiteboards, switches, lights, laptop trolleys to ensure all were off over the half term break. They then surveyed the energy used over half term compared to last year's half term data. They discovered that there was not in fact a decrease in energy over this half term, despite their best efforts, and intend to look further into reducing energy usage.





All students are presently working on a project we are calling *The Living Wall*. They are looking to help design a living wall area in the school grounds to help biodiversity. And with the nicer weather coming they also hope to get planting in the allotment, so they grow and sell some more produce again.

Women's History Month


Every March Women's History Month raises awareness of the contributions women have made to events throughout history and society. Active Citizenship Project

The Year 10 Active Citizenship Project at Soar Valley College is an impactful initiative that encourages students to become engaged and responsible members of their community. Each student is part of a dedicated group focusing on one of five areas: Leadership, Environment, Hope, Thanks, or International. These groups are designed to empower students to make a difference and develop skills that will benefit both themselves and the wider community.

One of the highlights of this term was the group of 32 Year 10 students who visited Taylor Road Primary School. Their mission was to encourage and support younger students in becoming active through sport during lunchtime. This handson project not only helped improve physical activity levels but also fostered positive relationships between the two schools, providing a fun and engaging way for students to work together.

In addition, 24 students from the Hope group baked and sold cakes to raise funds for a local refugee project. This initiative demonstrated their commitment to supporting those in need and making a tangible difference in their community. The funds raised will go toward providing essential resources for refugees, ensuring they receive the support they need to build a new life in Leicester.

Looking ahead, Year 10 students will continue their active citizenship efforts next term. Careers Update

The Spring term has been very busy for Careers Education at Soar Valley College.

In February, we ran a number of events during National Apprenticeship Week, and were very pleased to welcome a range of providers into school to talk to students in all year groups about apprenticeships as a valuable Post 16 Option.

A small group of budding Year 11 apprentices were fortunate to attend an event last week at City Hall where they had the opportunity to speak with and network with a range of apprenticeship providers. This proved to be a great experience for the students involved.

We were also pleased to be able to offer a virtual talk on apprenticeships this academic year for the parents / carers of our KS4 students. Thank you to all who attended.

National Apprenticeship Week was followed in March by National Careers Week. Once again, we welcomed a host of employers into school to talk with students in assembly about their day-to-day duties within the world of work. Students had the chance also to take part in subject specific career focused tasks enabling them to see how transferrable skills learnt across the curriculum can support them for their ongoing careers journey.

The organisation of Year 10 work experience placements continues. Students have been receiving weekly career sessions during their AM registration time to help prepare them for their work experience in June.

In addition, our Year 10 students had the chance to take part in a mock interview with an employer on Wednesday April 9th. This should be an invaluable experience for students as they begin to think about Year 11 and life after Soar Valley. The feedback from the employers who conducted the interviews was overwhelmingly positive and they could not speak highly enough of our students. Well done to them all for presenting themselves so professionally during the interviews.

Further to this, in a recent tutor period, our Year 10 cohort used our Unifrog platform to create their first CV. Please do encourage your child to log on to their Unifrog account. 

The Scholars Programme

Over the course of this year, 42 students in Year 9 have engaged with a programme run by the Brilliant Club called the Scholars Programme. They are taught a specialised topic over several weeks, in university-style tutorial groups, and learn how to research and write in a way that is typical of university study. At the end of the programme, they attend a graduation ceremony at a university in the region to celebrate their hard work and effort.

The first graduation ceremony happened in February, with 14 students going to Sheffield University to celebrate their results, which were all excellent. Special congratulations go to Dhruv 9.2, Moosa 9.8 and Anas 9.11 who all got a 1st for their final writing assignment, which is the equivalent of a good grade at A Level! At the ceremony, Dhruv spoke to a number of students from other Scholars Programme schools about the topic they had studied, Muslim women's education, representing Soar Valley College on a wider stage – well done Dhruv!

The next cohort's graduation happens on 6th May, and we look forward to congratulating more students for their superb efforts.





Geography Lecture

On Wednesday 19th March ten very keen Year 10 and 11 geographers boarded a minibus heading for the University of Nottingham to take part in a lecture put on by the Geographical Association. The lecture was entitled 'Nottingham's River: The Leen, risk management and place making' and was about the history of the River Leen and how it has changed over time due to the way humans have changed the way the land is used in the area.

The lecture started with an interactive task where students were given historical maps from the early 1800s and were asked to track the course of the river from source to mouth and predict the challenges and opportunities this presented for the area it travelled through. Our students fully engaged in this task and enjoyed applying what they have been learning in their lessons to a real-life situation making some fantastic annotations which the lecturer was very impressed with.

Throughout the talk our students represented Soar Valley College brilliantly and loved the opportunity to further learn about possible different careers directions geography could take them in.

They then outshone the rest of the room when it came to the question and answers section with well thought out and considered questions which showed a high level of understanding and engagement with the talk. This was particularly impressive as the rest of the audience were A Level and university students. It was great to see our students so engaged and passionate about the importance of geography and we are all excited for the next lecture.

Ultimate Frisbee Festival

On the 12th February we hosted a Year 4 Primary School Ultimate Frisbee festival. Teams of four boys and four girls from Mellor, Rushey Mead, Sandfield, Taylor Road and Wyvern took part in a fantastic event that was organised and run by seven of our wonderful Year 10 Sports Leaders. They did a great job, ensuring the festival was fun, competitive and safe throughout. Well done to Hassan, Pietro, Younus, Mishary, Benjamin, Om and Kajesh.

Young People's Council updates

As members of the Leicester Young People's Council, our role is to represent the voice of young people across Leicester. This role includes attending meetings with other council members, discussing important issues like mental health or education, and taking steps to help our local communities. An example of this is the short films that we as a council created, to be shown to children being placed into care to help them understand the circumstances they are moving into and to help them better adjust to their new circumstances.

Another aspect of our role is organising events, an example of which was a red-carpet event we held recently. Many members of the council, including the Assistant Mayor Elaine Pantling, attended and watched the unveiling of our new schemes, and the short films we produced. Other members of the council visited the BBC to do a radio interview, where they discussed the work our council is doing, and what we hope to achieve.

Our very first meeting as a group was in the Town Hall in the city centre. We got to meet with new people and understand what they wanted to do to help change Leicester as well as sharing our views. After this, we were greeted by Leicester's councillors as well as the Mayor, Sir Peter Soulsby. We were told information about our new role and how important it is for young people's voices to be heard. After the welcome we were asked to recite an oath in order to join the Young People's Council. The oath reminded us to be the best we can and be respectful and considerate of others. Soon, we were given certificates before being given a chance to explore the rest of the Town Hall! It was a wonderful evening!

In recent meetings we have been preparing and delivering speeches for different roles on the council, such as being on the marketing team. Other roles that people could apply for in the YPC included chair, vice chair, and note taker. These positions are crucial for leadership, organisation and keeping track of meetings and discussions - which many were interested in, making it competitive, due to the limited spaces. Although we were initially nervous, it was an invaluable experience that greatly enhanced our confidence. The results haven't been announced yet - feel free to ask us in school about which positions we applied for and for updates on whether we got the roles!
