Message from the Principal


Happy Jólabókflóð

We also enjoyed a bake sale on both the Thursday and Friday break times of the CIN week. A great selection of delicious cakes and cookies were enjoyed by all.



In the words of members of the Eco-Team Rajvi, Yukti and Angel, "Our planet is already beginning to feel the catastrophic effects of climate change, plastic pollution, biodiversity loss and a myriad of other environmental challenges. Now is the time for all of us to act."

Examples of the work conducted by the Eco-Team this half term include:

- Hosting a workshop with Sustrans, a sustainable transport charity, to come up with ideas about how to get more students and staff to use sustainable methods of transport and to reduce their carbon footprints. Watch this space to see some of these ideas in action next term!
- Conducting an environmental review of the school, undertaken by the School Business Manager and the G4S Site Manager, to see how environmentally friendly the school currently is. This has helped to shape our thinking for the year ahead.

- Joining The Climate Coalition initiative to send Boris Johnson (recycled) Christmas cards to encourage him to ensure promises made at COP26 are kept.

The books will be given to students after the Christmas break and will be part of an exciting project in English and library lessons, to encourage and promote the importance of reading for pleasure and enjoyment.




European Day of Languages

Several groups have then used this knowledge to create a mini revision booklet on Stanislavski, some of which are shown here.



Year 8 Stage Silent Performances

Following on from the Melodrama unit students are now learning about other genres of performance and this term we focused on Silent movies. They have been using their knowledge from melodrama to create their own silent movie and are currently editing their films for review in lessons before we break for Christmas. They have had to plan and organise their own filming schedule and then film on location around school before finally creating their own movies and editing them.








Drama Students Focus on Careers in Year 9

A very disappointed Mrs Megginson, who teaches the group, told us, "I have been trying to remember how long this activity has been taking place and I believe it is at least 25 years, possibly longer."

So, instead of a visit, this year the AIM group have put together over forty gift bags for the residents with items donated by staff and students and have sent a greeting along with the gifts. They have also made some decorations to hang on the tree in the nursing home. We are also hoping to record a video greeting later this week.

We hope that this small gesture will go some way towards giving the elderly people at the home the best Christmas they can have.
