It means that almost 95% of our students and almost all staff are testing twice a week, and are able to identify asymptomatic cases quickly, making the school a safer place for everyone. Students and parents have been brilliant at reporting positive results promptly to us at school, which has been very helpful.

There is a clear plan for those in Year 11, who will be undertaking further assessments after the Easter break which will contribute towards their Teacher Assessed Grades. Language Leaders @ Soar Valley


Creative Geography



To help students spend time away from their screens during the period of remote learning, students in Years 7 and 8 were asked to show their knowledge and understanding in more creative ways.

In the Year 7 unit on 'The Restless Earth', students had the opportunity to apply their knowledge of the types and effects of volcanoes by creating a piece in any way they chose. They came up with a

variety of ideas from 3D models, board games and even a volcano made entirely from socks!



Year 8 students demonstrated their understanding of coastal processes and management by designing and justifying the most appropriate coastal management strategy for Happisburgh.

I have chosen groynes as they would absorb the wave energy preventing the sediments to erodes and trap the sediments but also rip-rap to protect the soft land cliff as it would prevent the waves from crashing and eroding the cliff. This indicates that it would reduce the hydraulic action and abrasion.

I have decided not to place a sew all as the coastal protection because the sea walls are expensive and the beach covers large scale, so for this reason I did not create sea wall as a defence. This coastal protection will protect Happibourph as the groynes and rip-rap will limit the power of wave by absorbing the energy, so it would not reach the cliff decreasing the amount of erosion from occurring and due rip-rap, the soft cliff will be protected.

Library News: World Book Day and Beyond

Thursday 4th March was World Book Day, a time where we celebrate books and all things reading. At Soar Valley we ran a week of activities, including getting inspiration for our future reads and learning about creative writing in online workshops, and competitions like the Big Book Quiz. One highlight was the House competition, where students were asked to create a scene from a favourite book using only items found in the kitchen.



Author of the *I am... Emily Knight* books, A. Bello, even recorded a very special author talk for our students. She talked about her writing, what it's like to become an author, and even offered some advice for budding writers. It is fascinating to be inside the mind of an author! Our shortlisted books are still available to read and voting will finish on 28th May, so you still have time to choose your favourite. Drama Updates



Over the lockdown session, Year 8 students spent some time learning about different types of performances, most recently exploring puppets in performance. Prior to Christmas, the students were given the chance to use full-sized puppets in lessons and considered how they can communicate using non-verbal communication skills and lighting/sound.

The groups were exploring the various skills required to perform and bring a puppet to life for an audience, with many of them then creating a

final short video of their own puppets performing.

Year 9 students have been focussing on the skill of special effects make-up. This is an option of specialism in the BTEC in Key Stage 4. Students created fake injuries on their hands and fingers to create a believable injury.

Students thoroughly enjoyed using the materials and experimenting with the fake blood and injury wax. It was interesting learning about the different stages of bruising and appreciating that, to do the job well, you need to do research, practice and follow guidance from a director. Many of the students created very realistic injuries and enjoyed fooling their friends following the lessons. Don't worry, no students were harmed in the making of these lessons!

Arts Award

A small group of students in year 7 are exploring the Arts in some of their lessons and have been participating in workshops to learn a variety of skills. They will be creating presentations about what they have learnt and evaluations of the skills they develop. When they have completed their journey, they will be nominated for assessment to receive the Bronze Arts Award.



What is it?

The Bronze Arts Award is a unique qualifications that supports anyone aged up to 25 to grow as artists and arts leaders, inspiring them to connect with and take part in the wider arts world. Young people take on challenges in an art form, participate in arts activities and experience arts events whilst becoming inspired by artists and through leading others. The Award can be based around any arts or media activity and reflects many different interests and ambitions. It encourages individual development whilst also helping young people define their creative futures.

This first few weeks of the sessions, will see our group participate in stage combat workshops, as well as learning to create for an audience. Soon after this the group will look at Arts inspirations from a variety of fields and learn presentation skills as they hope to inspire others to find out more about their chosen Arts person.



Changes in Drama



Over the lockdown period, the drama studios underwent a few mini transformations, with manual lighting desks and sound desks being reinstated. This allows students the chance to learn how to programme and operate sound and lighting in a performance setting. It means that at Key Stage 4, students can select a technical skill as their assessment option. Students are able to work independently and create programmes for their own work which they can then run live for an audience.

Sports News

PE extra-curricular activities have restarted, with 4 different sports available to each of Year 7, 8 and 9. So far 164 students have signed up, which is fantastic, with Year 9 *just* in the lead in terms of numbers participating. With the number of opportunities for physical activity so limited in the last 12 months, this is a great chance to have some fun, develop new skills and increase fitness levels
