## BHM@SVC

Throughout October at Soar Valley we have been celebrating Black History Month. Here's what's been going on...

#### The launch:

The month kicked off with assemblies for all year groups where they learnt about the origins of this month focused on Black history and the representation of Black people in the media.

One focus of the assembly was ensuring that students understood the two aims of the month:

- To mark the contributions of Black people throughout history.
- To recognise the contributions of Black people to the economic, cultural and political life in the UK.

#### The Student Bulletin:

As our primary medium for communicating key messages to students we utilised the bulletin to continue to spread the core messages of Black History Month. Each day we celebrated a different person of Black origin. Student volunteers, along with staff from each subject area, created a fact file about someone who we should know more about in terms of how they have positively impacted on the society in which we live.

### **Registration:**

Students also had the opportunity to discuss the under representation and misrepresentation of Black people in the media that we see every day, whether that be films, news, video games or commercials, and our role in tackling those misconceptions. We also used this time to make students aware of the many different projects around Black History Month such as Black to Front by Channel 4.

### The Library:

Students were provided with a vast reading list of texts within our own library that feature Black leading characters or are written by Black authors. This had a fantastic response from students with the number of these books being taken out of the library significantly increasing on the back of the assembly.

#### **Staff Reading Recommendations:**

To further support this all staff have contributed by updating their 'I'm currently reading...' signs on their classroom/office doors to books from this very list or expanding the students' horizons with other related books.

## **Everybody's Reading Week**

Soar Valley recently celebrated our annual Everybody's Reading Week. This involved lots of challenges and competitions as well as discussing our favourite reads. Students designed brand new bookmarks, and the best designs will be printed and made into new bookmarks for use in our library.

Form groups also competed in a range of challenges including designing a glass jar to represent a favourite book, reading ebooks on our online system, and even guessing how many pages of books our librarian Ms Codling will read this term (as part of her new role as a judge for the famous Carnegie and Kate Greenaway book awards).
