Events included an Information, Advice and Guidance session where students learned about how to apply to university and the vast array of courses available.

There was also a chance to tour the campus and to get a sense of what university life would feel like.

The work produced by the students was exceptional, working with their PhD tutor on a project entitled **The Whistleblowers: Engaging Patients and the Public for Patient Safety.**

5 students [Tejal, Zainab, Morley, Sumayyah and Dene] achieved a 1st in their final assignment. Every other student produced an assignment that scored a 2.1. This makes them the first cohort where every student performed at the standard expected of an A Level student. Not bad considering that they are only in Year 9!

Year 10 Immigration Presentations

Mrs Underwood's GCSE citizenship students have been learning about immigration in lessons. The aim of the Year 10 immigration presentations was to educate students on how life in the UK is changing and the impact of multiculturalism in day-to-day life.

The population in the UK is rapidly changing because of the increase of immigration and this has led to a large change in what society looks like today. By getting students to research a country and their contributions to the UK, it allowed them to understand how this country has benefited from the cultures of migrant communities and created a deeper understanding of multiculturalism. As well as this, these presentations helped to combat any harmful stereotypes around immigration in the media which often has a negative impact on people's view.

The immigration presentations were influenced by wider issues in the community, especially the lack of awareness in society. To combat this one of the aims of the presentations was to promote awareness of integration issues in the UK and by doing this reduce the amount of negativity around multiculturalism and negate the harmful media stereotypes. Additionally, as the presentations were a part of citizenship, one of the main themes was 'freedom of expression' which celebrates self-expression and promotes individual cultural identity.


Reading Rampage, our Year 7 and 8 reading challenge is drawing to a close after half-term.

Well done to all of the students that have taken part over the last couple of months.


In terms of the results, early indications suggest Watermead is the house that has read and reviewed the most Reading Rampage titles.

Comic Book Competition


Reading for pleasure is immensely important as it aids learning and development and is a wonderful form of relaxation.


Mission Possible
