

Gold Medal Performance!

We are delighted to announce that Soar Valley College has achieved the School Games Gold Mark Award for the 2021/22 academic year.

The School Games Mark is a government led award scheme launched in 2012 and facilitated by the Youth Sport Trust. The aim is to recognise and reward a school's engagement in school games, looking at what is provided and the strength of the uptake compared to national benchmarks.

The purpose of the scheme is to celebrate keeping young people active, by providing positive experiences of daily activity or competition. As you can imagine, we are very proud to have been recognised for our successful programme of sporting activity.

As a community we are extremely proud of our students for their dedication to all aspects of physical activity and school sport, including those young volunteers, leaders and officials who have made our events possible during the year.

We then played host to 4 of our local primary schools on the 15th June who also had the opportunity to take part in the inclusive sports.

The students had a wonderful time and the experience really helped to develop their confidence, awareness of para sports and self esteem. 
University Essay Competition

Although the academic year is drawing to a close, a number of our students are still looking for opportunities to excel.

At present several of our Year 10 students are working on an essay for a competition run by Exeter University. This requires them to use their research skills before writing a 1000 word essay on the subject of religion.

There is a choice of three titles, and these all relate to the role that religion plays within society, particularly in a post-Covid world. The students taking part are having to think hard about difficult ideas, and are relishing the opportunity to develop careful arguments across a longer piece of writing than they would normally produce for their GCSE course.

Fingers crossed that we can bring home the prize for the wining essay, but in this case it really is the taking part that counts.





Anti Bullying Ambassadors Training

This year Soar Valley College became a member of the Leicester and Leicestershire branch of Citizens UK. This is a broad-based alliance of 25 local civil society groups, including schools, a university, faith institutions, community groups and charities from across our wonderful city and county. They use the Community Organising method to listen to the communities, identify the issues that affect the residents, build campaigns and take action to win long-lasting, systemic change.

As mentioned in a previous newsletter, the student volunteer members of Active Citizens planned a full listening campaign for the school to discover what Soar Valley students are passionate about and what issues we can work on for social justice. This listening campaign gave the opportunity for every single student to voice their opinions. Overwhelmingly, the most frequent response was a concern about the lack of cleanliness in the areas surrounding the school and the common routes to school that students take. After extensive campaigning to the council, local councillor and our local MP, we finally managed to secure action on this issue. This half term the council's cleansing team have already begun work on the surrounding areas and walking routes near to school and hopefully there will be more litter bins installed close to school.

The major project we have worked on this year in the Active Citizens group is becoming an accredited Refugee Welcome School. Over the year our students have been busy working to make a Refugee Welcome, Refugee Awareness and Refugee Action Plan for our school. They have had multiple meetings as part of this, including a very meaningful one with representatives from a local synagogue. On Friday 24th June, all the groups in the alliance gathered together to hear our students' journeys and celebrate their massive Refugee Welcome Schools accreditation achievement. The students who attended were absolutely fantastic when presenting Soar Valley's work and represented the school superbly; we are all so proud of them.

We have also worked with other members of our alliance on an anti-racism campaign. We have had meetings with other schools and organisations and students have voiced their opinions on this topical issue. There will be lots of work happening on this social justice campaign next year by Active Citizens group. We hope to be able to share some successful actions next year with you.
